- The Voter's Guide was mailed to all residents in Town this week. It is also available at Town Hall, the Library, as well as on the Town's website.

Economic Development Tools Update from the EDCAC

The Town Council was presented with findings from the Economic Development Citizens Advisory Committee's research and review of the Economic Revitalization Zones (ERZ) available under RSA 162-N, as assigned by the Town Council at the August 18, 2011 meeting. EDCAC Chair Susan Lee and EDCAC member Marc Casseres presented the information and provided an overview of Economic Revitalization Zones and how Merrimack can take advantage of them. Merrimack currently has 3 ERZs: 40 Continental Blvd., 10-21 Continental Blvd., and 57-59 D.W. Highway. The Town, nor the tenants have ever taken advantage of the benefits so it is possible that some educating needs to take place. Mr. Casseres reviewed how the tax credit would work and the process for establishing an ERZ. The EDCAC recommends designating the Zyla's property and the old Shaw's plaza property as an ERZ. They also recommend an education and awareness program, especially for those currently in an ERZ. Chairman Rothhaus asked about the tenants currently not taking advantage of being in an ERZ. Mr. Casseres stated that several of those tenants were there before the property was designated as an ERZ and they may not be educated enough about it or may not have been told about the designation and how they can take advantage of it. Councilor Dwyer asked if those properties in a designated ERZ that are not taking advantage of it could be undesignated, therefore allowing other properties to be designated. Mr. Casseres stated that is a good strategy and one that should be looked at more closely. He stated the Town Council has the power to remove a property as an ERZ. Town Manager Eileen Cabanel suggested letting real estate developers and owners of current ERZ properties know that this tool is available because it can be turned around in a quick time. Community Development Director Tim Thompson explained that the city of Concord sets up development agreements with potential developers before they enter into the areas and have the Council designate the zones so all of the rules are clear. Susan Lee explained 79-E which is the Community Revitalization Tax Relief Incentive and that it is something else the Committee is also looking at. She stated that perhaps with coordination with the Community Development Department and reaching out to the Merrimack Chamber, they could provide education about the ERZ. Councilor Dwyer feels that the incentive is not enough for a local NH company to move to Merrimack, but it may be enough of an incentive to lure in Massachusetts companies.

<u>MOTION</u> made by Vice Chair Boyd and seconded by Councilor Mahon to designate the Zyla's parcel and old Shaw's plaza parcel be designated as Economic Revitalization Zones under RSA 162-N.

Discussion on the motion

Community Development Director Tim Thompson made the suggestion to have the Council revise the motion to have Community Development begin the process of applying for the designation through the State.

<u>MOTION</u> made by Vice Chair Boyd and seconded by Councilor Mahon to task the Community Development Director Tim Thompson with reaching out to advise the State of NH that the old Shaw's plaza and Zyla's parcels, be deemed as Economic Revitalization Zones and authorize him to fill out any paperwork necessary, subject to the jurisdiction of the Town Manager. <u>MOTION CARRIES 7-0-0</u> Discussion on the motion

Vice Chair Boyd thanked the EDCAC for their work on this presentation.

<u>MOTION</u> made by Vice Chair Boyd and seconded by Councilor Dwyer to renew the EDCAC's charge of looking into economic development tools available under RSA 79-E, RSA 162-K, RSA 674:21, and any other additional legislations for an additional 6 months. <u>MOTION CARRIES 7-0-0</u>

New Business

Approval of Fundraisers to Benefit the Watson Park Dog Park

Submitted by Parks and Recreation Director Sherry Kalish

The Town Council considered the approval of fundraisers sponsored by some members of the Dog Park Subcommittee with proceeds to be donated to a Dog Park fund. Parks and Recreation Director Sherry Kalish stated that a press release was done looking for volunteers for the Dog Park Subcommittee and they received 46 responses. She discussed the fundraisers that the Subcommittee would like to do. The first is at the Rabies Clinic on April 14th and also, Teresa of Pets Choice in Merrimack would like to do a raffle for dog food to also sell reusable bags with proceeds going to the Dog Park. Councilor Flood stated that the donations would be easier to manage if they were for either the Dog Park or Pavilion. Sherry Kalish stated that they are looking for permission to have fundraisers and to not have to come before the Council for each fundraiser they have. Councilor Koenig stated that Watson Park was originally established as being driven by fundraising and not Town funds and it would seem appropriate to give them approval to fundraise within limits. Councilor Flood stated there was some confusion as to whether that applied to Watson Park or just the Watson Park Committee which is now disbanded and whether there could still be fundraising done without coming to the Council. Finance Director Paul Micali stated that as the Watson Park Committee was established they could raise up to \$125,000 for Watson Park improvements, with donations of \$5,000 or more having to come before the Council.

<u>MOTION</u> made by Councilor Flood and seconded by Councilor Mahon to give permission to the members of the Parks & Recreation Committee to hold fundraisers to be dedicated to a Dog Park Fund. <u>MOTION CARRIES 7-0-0</u>

Discussion on the motion

Councilor Flood stated that the Dog Park Subcommittee has gotten off to a good start and she would like to see them succeed as soon as possible. Councilor Mahon asked Sherry Kalish what the Subcommittee feels they need to fundraise in order to set up the Dog Park. Sherry Kalish explained that currently the subcommittee hasn't come up with a definite figure yet. She stated that the fence alone will run about \$18,000.

Approval of Parks and Recreation Committee Donation Cap for Watson Park Improvements *Submitted by Town Councilor Jackie Flood*

The Town Council considered the approval of establishing a dollar limit for donations for Watson Park improvements that the Parks and Recreation Committee can accept up to a set amount without Town Council approval. Councilor Flood stated that the Parks and Recreation Committee has taken over the responsibility for Watson Park and that they would like to keep the ceiling in place that the Watson Park Committee had that enabled them to accept up to \$5,000 in donations without Town Council approval. Finance Director Paul Micali explained how donations were handled for the Watson Park Committee and that a ceiling was put in place for the total amount of donations that can be raised. If the Committee was to reach the set limit, they would then need to come before the Council fro approval to raise the additional funds to reach their goal.

Councilor Dwyer didn't understand the use of the word "limit" for donations. Councilor Koenig explained that a large donation should be publically acknowledged. Councilor Mahon stated that unanticipated money needs to be accepted under RSA 31:95-B and there is a provision in the Charter relating to it. He explained that the Committee is really asking for a threshold in which they would have to come to the Council for acceptance and to accept the money under RSA 31:95-B, a public hearing must be held and the Council must accept the monies. Councilor Mahon suggested that the Committee be given a timeline, such as 90 days, rather than a threshold or limit, for how often the Committee must come before the Council for acceptance and acknowledgment of all donations to that point. This will allow RSA 31:95-B and Charter requirements to be met.

<u>MOTION</u> made by Councilor Mahon and seconded by Vice Chair Boyd to have the Parks and Recreation Committee appear before the Town Council at least every 90 days to seek approval for any donations they might receive for any improvements to Watson Park, pursuant to RSA 31:95-B and the Merrimack Town Charter Article 8-15. MOTION CARRIES 7-0-0

Town Hall Meeting Room Naming Discussion

The Town Council discussed the possibility of soliciting suggestions to name the Town Hall Meeting Room, formerly known as the courtroom. Councilor Flood is looking for help from the Council on renaming the Town Hall Meeting Room following the Park & Facility Naming Policy. She stated that it could be done through the Parks and Recreation Committee, who would advertise the opportunity to people via the School Board, newspapers and meetings and solicit suggestions. Councilor Flood said the name would have to meet the criteria of the policy, which she reviewed. It would be required for people to send their suggestions via the form on the website to the Parks and Recreation Committee, c/o Sherry Kalish. Councilor Flood shared three of her suggestions: Daniel Webster, Timothy Taylor, and Forrest Sherman. She suggested that both meeting rooms (East & West) be renamed as part of this effort. Councilor Dwyer questioned whether the whole building should be named, rather than just the meeting room. Councilor Koenig stated that giving the meeting room a specific name helps to identify a destination. Chairman Rothhaus said that he would like it to be the Matthew Thornton room to keep it local. Councilor Mahon agrees. Councilor Dwyer feels that Matthew Thornton is already represented enough throughout Town.

<u>MOTION</u> made by Councilor Flood and seconded by Vice Chair Boyd to publicize a naming opportunity throughout the Town to submit a name for the west wing meeting room and also for the east wing meeting room. <u>MOTION CARRIES 7-0-0</u>
