## Information for the Merrimack, NH Town Council

The environmental impact of bees is fascinating and so important. From the apples we get at Currier Orchards in the fall to the beautiful flowers we see, and so many things in between. Bees are needed. Feral honey bees are not common in this area. Due to our harsh winters it is common that they do not survive. Beekeepers are able to help the bees thrive in our local environment

### Property under discussion



We would discuss with the transfer station manager what we are looking for and see if this area will meet our needs.

Some of those needs include: A relatively level surface. Year round access. As well as vehicle access to the hives location during spring, summer and fall.


Typically hives get moved at night however we realize that access to this property will be limited at that time. We will adjust to accommodate the transfer station hours.


It is our expectation that we will maintain the area surrounding the hives. It is our intention that no town employee should have to interact in or around the apiary

### Examples of current apiaries

We currently have 3 separate apiary sites. One at our home and two other locations in which the home owners allow us the use of their property.

To date we have had no issues with property owners or with neighbors.





We are in our pool all summer without any interference or concern for the hives. Though they may roll their eyes at some of our dives off the board.

Our fence borders 3 separate neighbors. There have been no interactions or calls of concern.

2 homes over from us is another beekeeper with roughly the same amount of hives. There have been no issues within the neighborhood. Just beautiful flowers.

#### **Host hive Property**



The hives at the transfer station will be set up much like this. We do enclose the hives in a solar powered electric fence to prevent any hungry natives from visiting.





The hives do well in relative proximity to normal daily activities without causing issues. You can't see it in this picture but the homeowner's garden is between the driveway and the hives.

#### We're all abuzz about the Bees



This is what the inside of a bee box looks like. All of those frames are filled with honey and baby bees in the making.
