

Town Council Meeting Minutes



Thursday, October 8, 2020, at 6:30 PM, in Abbie Griffin Park Meeting Continued in the Matthew Thornton Room at 7:00 PM

Chairman Koenig called the meeting of the Town Council to order at 6:30 p.m. Present at the meeting were Chairman Koenig, Vice Chairman Boyd, Councilor Rothhaus, Councilor Harrington, Councilor Albert, Councilor Healey, Councilor Woods, Town Manager Eileen Cabanel and Assistant Town Manager/Finance Director Paul Micali.

Pledge of Allegiance

Chairman Koenig led in the Pledge of Allegiance.

The Town Council met at the Abbie Griffin Bandstand gazebo to accommodate the large number of attendees.

1. Recognition of Retirement of Town Employee

The Town Council presented a recognition award to Police Chief Denise Roy in recognition of her retirement from the Merrimack Police Department after almost 27 years of full-time service to the Merrimack Police Department: January 16, 1994 – October 15, 2020. Denise also served in a part-time capacity for 3 years prior to being hired full-time. Employees with at least 10 years of service receive a Plaque with Town Seal upon retirement.

Deputy Chief Brian Levesque stated that Chief Denise Roy started in 1991 as a part time officer and during her career she filled every position within the Police Department. He stated that as a boss Chief Roy is caring and she worried about the safety of her officers. He stressed that he could not have asked for a better boss. He stated that she is progressive, willing to listen and is liked by every officer. Deputy Chief Levesque and the Police Department appreciates her comical side. He stressed that Chief Roy will be sorely missed.

State Representative Richard Hinch read a proclamation from Governor Sununu commending Chief Roy's service. State Representative Hinch expressed his personal appreciation to Chief Roy. Chairman Koenig presented Chief Roy with a plaque of appreciation for her service to the Town of Merrimack for 26 years.

Police Chief Denise Roy thanked everyone for coming. She thanked Town Manager Eileen Cabanel for her friendship and teaching her to stand up tall for what you believe in. She said other lessons Town Manager Eileen Cabanel taught her are that cooler heads prevail and not everything needs a response. Police Chief Roy hopes that their friendship will continue and from one cancer survivor to another she thanked her.

Police Chief Roy thanked members of the community for their constant support of the Police Department. She thanked her family for their support without which she would not have been successful in her career. She explained that having seven siblings it has forced her to have thick skin which she stated is the number one attribute a Police Chief must have in today's environment. Police Chief Roy thanked Kris for support and encouragement. She stated is excited for the next chapter.

Police Chief Roy thanked Brian, Matt, Kerry, and Eric. She expressed her love and gratitude to them for being there for her during the good and bad. She urged them always look out for each other. Police Chief Roy thanked the members of the Merrimack Police Department. She stated that the officers are the heart and soul of the department. She stated that their dedication to the profession is inspiring. Police Chief Roy encouraged the officers to be open minded and to always look out for each other. She sincerely thanked the Merrimack Police officers for unwavering support.

Councilor Albert thanked Chief Roy for her dedication to the Merrimack Police Department. Councilor Rothhaus offered his appreciation to Chief Roy for everything she offered to the Town of Merrimack throughout her career. Vice Chair Boyd reiterated his admiration of Chief Roy. He stated that she is the consumet professional and she has passed those traits down throughout the Merrimack Police Department. Town Manager Eileen Cabanel stated that she has learned so much from Chief Roy. She has learned how to grow those around you and give credit to others. Town Manager Eileen Cabanel expressed that she is extremely proud of Chief Roy. Members of the Merrimack Crime Line spoke from the audience praising Chief Roy for her dedication to the Town of Merrimack. Chief Roy's name will be added to the list of retired police chiefs for a scholarship for students who want to explore law enforcement. Chairman Koenig expressed his appreciation to Chief Roy, he appreciates her integrity and humor. He is confident that her contributions to the Town and to the Police Department will have a lasting effect.

2. Police Chief Position Confirmation Submitted by Town Manager Eileen Cabanel

The Town Council considered the confirmation of the appointment of a new Police Chief, pursuant to Charter Article 7-8. Town Manager Eileen Cabanel announced that she is recommending Deputy Chief Brian Levesque to be the next police chief. She explained that Merrimack has been fortunate to be able to appoint from within the department.

<u>MOTION</u> made by Councilor Harrington and seconded by Councilor Albert confirm the appointment of Deputy Chief Brian Levesque as the new Merrimack Police Chief. <u>MOTION</u> <u>CARRIES 7-0-0</u>

Town Manager Eileen Cabanel recapped Deputy Chief Levesque's 20-year career. She stated that he has a tremendous amount of experience. She stated that he is intelligent and well rounded. Town Manager Eileen Cabanel stressed that she is proud of Deputy Chief Levesque and all the officers who make up the Merrimack Police Department. She spoke about the long-standing connection between the Merrimack residents and the police department.

Police Chief Roy stated that she is leaving in the Police Department in great hands. She stressed to the officers that the command staff under Deputy Chief Levesque's leadership will do anything they can to make sure the officers go home safely.

 Police Chief Roy asked Deputy Chief Levesque's wife Megan and son Cole to join her for the pinning ceremony. Megan Levesque pinned Deputy Chief Levesque. Chairman Koenig expressed his appreciation to Megan Levesque for her support of her husband and for her sacrifice. Deputy Chief Levesque thanked the Town Council and the Town Manager for the opportunity to lead the best Police Department. He stated how proud the Police Officers and employees make him each day. He assured the officers that the department will continue to grow with the times, provide training and technology to assist them. Giving them the tools that they will need to be successful and safe. He urged the officers to look out for one another and support each other.

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Town Manager Eileen Cabanel made the following announcement

- The Transfer Station will be partnering with Eversource again this year to provide a free Freon day for Merrimack Residents. On Saturday, October 17, Merrimack residents can bring their unwanted residential air conditioners, dehumidifiers, freezers, and refrigerators to the Transfer Station and Eversource will pick up the disposal cost.
- Absentee ballots: The Town Clerk's office strongly encourages persons wishing to vote by absentee ballot in November to submit their request for an absentee ballot as soon as possible. An absentee ballot request form can be found on the Town's website. Due to the number of inquiries being received, we wish to inform voters that the General Election is the same as the Presidential Election. There will be only one ballot in November with all Republican and Democratic candidates. Party affiliation is not a factor in this election. 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Appointments

- 1. Annual Review with the Agricultural Commission
- 44 Submitted by Agricultural Commission Chair Bob McCabe
- 45 Per Town of Merrimack Charter Section 6-6, at least annually, there should be an annual review with the
- 46 Agricultural Commission. This agenda item is to highlight the commission's significant actions, current
- 47 projects, anticipated actions, and to raise any concerns the Council should know or could act on.

- 49 Agricultural Commission Chair Bob McCabe advised the Town Council this year marked the 13th year for
- 50 the Merrimack Community Garden. The garden was ready by mid-May and many veteran gardeners

returned. They rented half the available garden plots. The farmers market was delayed until safety protocols were in place. The members were proactive and kept up with all the new safety training and webinars offered by the UNH Extension. They knew it would be a different Farmers Market this year with the safety protocols in place. The Farmers Market started with 12 vendors being a mix of farmers, honey wine soap and pain reliefs. He stated that the Census Bureau was also present at the Farmers Market. Agricultural Commission Chair Bob McCabe believes the pandemic reduced the number of patrons by half but overall, the season was very safe.

 Agricultural Commission Chair Bob McCabe advised the Town Council that the Farmers Market ran for 7 Wednesdays and ran from mid-June through mid-October. He explained that Agricultural Commission met a scholarship student who recently graduated from Merrimack High School. The student was interviewed and impressed the commission with her potential. She will be attending New England College in Henniker majoring in ornithology. After graduation from college she is hoping to begin a career with Fish and Game.

 Agricultural Commission Chair Bob McCabe spoke of the passing of Pete Gagnon. He had discussed with Nancy Gagnon, Pete's wife, the possibility of planting something in Town as a memorial to Pete. Nancy Gagnon asked Agricultural Commission Chair Bob McCabe to plant a red delicious apple tree at Wasserman Park near the community garden. The tree was planted in September. He stated that the tree memorial is in recognition of the 40 years of service that Pete Gagnon gave to Merrimack.

Councilor Harrington appreciates the gesture to plant a tree in Pete Gagnon's memory. Agricultural Commission Chair Bob McCabe asked the Town Council to consider placing Pete Gagnon's name at the base of the tree. Councilor Harrington supports the idea of a memorial stone and asked if the marker would include Nancy Gagnon's name as she has recently passed away. Agricultural Commission Chair Bob McCabe will ask the stone keeper. Chairman Koenig and Vice Chair Boyd voiced their support. Councilor Albert thanked Agricultural Commission Chair Bob McCabe for his hard work and dedication. Chairman Koenig and Councilor Healey expressed their appreciation for the commission's adaptation to the new safety protocols and the seamless operation of the Farmers Market.

Town Manager's Report

• The Library is delighted to welcome patrons back to the Library for "Pop in and Pick up" services. The Library building is open for browsing, computer usage, technical assistance, and notary services. All visitors should wear masks or face coverings, hand sanitize upon entering and observe social distance. The library programs will remain virtual and meeting rooms are still closed to the public. Fines for overdue items remain suspended. More details are available at www.merrimacklibrary.org

- Baboosic Lake Road sewer reconstruction update: The project is complete pending final test results and as-built survey drawings prior to formal acceptance. Town Manager Cabanel commended Kyle Fox for his outstanding oversight of this project.
- Old Blood Road update: The road reconstruction project is complete. Utility work remains to be completed by Consolidated Communications so that the existing utility poles can be removed. Town Manager Cabanel commended Kyle Fox for his outstanding oversight of this challenging project.
- The work on removal of the toll plazas at the Exit 11 ramps started today. The project will remove the toll plaza canopies, structural supports, toll booths, and concrete islands, and repair the concrete roadway slabs including placing a paved surface. Some work will require that ramps to be closed which can only occur on Saturdays per the contract and only one ramp at a time. NHDOT and their contractor will provide advanced notice of the ramp closures so that we can share the information through our website and various social media accounts.
- Town Manager Cabanel asked Kyle Fox Public Works Director for an update on the installation of the fence at Watson Park. He explained that he and the Finance Department are reviewing the bids.

Consent Agenda

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Chairman Koenig moved New Business item #1 up to be heard next on the agenda.

New Business

- 1. Memorial Bench at Watson Park Submitted by Sharon Bellemore
- 23 The Town Council considered a request to place a granite memorial bench, in memory of Richard E.
- 24 Bellemore, under the third tree on the left of the park facing the street at Watson Park. Sharon Bellemore
- explained to the Town Council that her husband enjoyed Watson Park. He grew up in Merrimack and his
- 26 family still lives in Merrimack. She stated the bench is 4 feet long and it is being made by Swenson
- 27 Granite.

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Councilor Albert suggested that in the future the Town Council should consider a policy for the placement layout that coincides with the masterplan. Chairman Koenig agreed and suggested the Town Council should review the Town's policy it relates to naming places or things after someone.

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<u>MOTION</u> made by Councilor Healey and seconded by Councilor Harrington to accept the placement of a granite memorial bench, in memory of Richard E. Bellemore at the designated location and Mrs. Bellemore to coordinate the logistics with the Town Manager's office. <u>MOTION CARRIES 7-0-0</u>

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Old Business

- 39 **1. Selection of Recycling Contract** Submitted by Public Works Director Kyle Fox
- 40 The current single stream recycling contract through the NRRA between the Town of Merrimack and E.L.
- 41 Harvey & Sons, Inc. is expiring November 30, 2020. The Town received proposals from two companies
- for the upcoming year(s) and Public Works is recommending accepting the proposal from EL Harvey,
- 43 which is our current vendor, for the next twelve-month period.

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Town Manager Eileen Cabanel explained that cost to recycle has drastically increased over the years. She explained that years ago the town was paid for their recycled materials but now it costs the town \$57.00 per ton. She is hopeful that things will turn around and she is comfortable with a one-year contract.

- 49 Kristopher Perreault Solid Waste Foreman utilized a power-point presentation. He advised the Town
- 50 Council that China who is a world leader in importing recycled material has banned all imports causing

prices to plummet. The Town of Merrimack has been protected by its contract which is expiring at the end of November 2020. Mr. Perreault advised the Town Council that single stream recycling tipping fee has increased from \$40.22 to over \$75.00 since 2017. He explained that going forward there are only a few options available regarding vendors. The three that are viable are Casella Waste Systems, EL Harvey & Sons (current vendor) and Waste Management.

Mr. Perreault stated that Casella has not returned his inquiries leaving EL Harvey & Sons and Waste Management. He explained that EL Harvey & Sons quoted a tipping fee of \$95 per ton, a haul charge of \$275 per haul (two containers at a time) and equipment rental of \$225 per month (includes a compactor and 7 boxes). He projected an annual cost of \$183,165 which breaks down to \$124 per ton. Waste Management annual cost was projected to be \$212,636 which breaks down to \$144 per ton.

Mr. Perrault recommends the Town Council accept the proposal from EL Harvey & Sons. He believes it makes good financial and operational sense to continue the long-standing relationship between the Town and EL Harvey & Sons.

Councilor Albert asked what the cost would be if the town moved away from single stream. Assistant Town Manager/Finance Director Paul Micali said the price is \$133 per ton for trash removal. Chairman Koenig agrees with Town Manager Eileen Cabanel that the Town should continue single stream recycling.

Councilor Albert commended Kyle Fox for the outstanding job he has done with the challenging road and bridge improvements he has overseen. He also commended the Public Works staff. Chairman Koenig and Councilor Harrington echoed the comments of Councilor Albert. Kyle Fox appreciates the kind words and will pass them along to his staff.

Comments from the Council

- Councilor Albert proposed the question to the Town Council to delay putting up the fence up until the
- 50 Spring since the issues have subsided. He suggested the Town Council have a conversation about the

need for a fence. Chairman Koenig stated that he is still against the fence and he is hopeful that Congressman Papas will be successful in finding an avenue that will allow the Town more latitude relative to the LWCF grant. Councilor Harrington believes the issues will occur again and the fence is inevitable. Councilor Rothhaus expressed his opposition to the fence. Chairman Koenig would like to see if Congressman Papas can find a solution. Councilor Healey spoke about the specification for the fence that includes a gate. She stated that a gate gives the Town Council flexibility as to when the gate is open or closed. She views it as a win for the Town. Town Manager Eileen Cabanel suggested allowing the motion to stand and to delay when the fence is installed. She stressed her hope that the Town Council will not rescind their order. Chairman Koenig does not believe the Town Council, as a whole, wants the fence delayed.

Chairman Koenig urged residents who are interested in voting by absentee ballot to do so sooner than later. He stressed that a tremendous effort is being made to keep everyone safe at the polls. He stated that voters need to wear a mask and social distance. Chairman Koenig reminded voters who typically vote at JMUES, that they will be voting at the high school.
